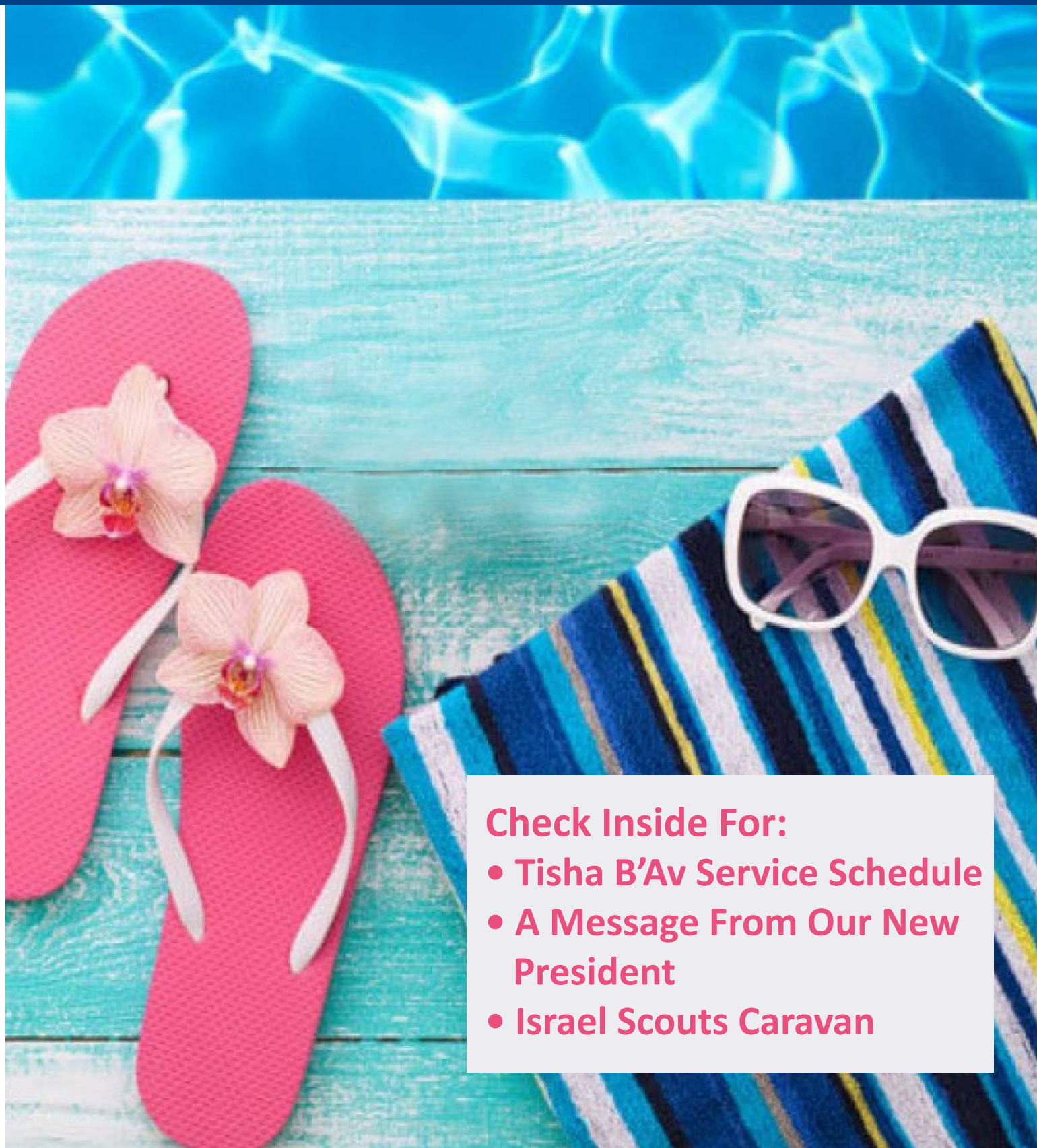

on my **mind**

In his 1997 book *Managing to Have Fun: How Fun at Work Can Motivate Your Employees, Inspire Your Coworkers, and Boost Your Bottom Line*, Matt Weinstein shared the following anecdote on human behavior that imparts a wonderful lesson:

I first learned about [the] ripple effect a few years ago when I went for a run through the streets of Berkeley with my friend Dale Larsen. Dale is a clinical psychologist, and although we had been friends for a long time, we had never gone running together before. After stretching, we began to run and had only gone a few blocks when I noticed that Dale reached into the pocket of his shorts, took out a handful of coins, and threw them over his shoulder.

The first couple of times this happened, I pretended not to notice. But after a while it began to drive me crazy—so I finally asked him, ‘Dale, what is the story with the money?’ Dale laughed and proceeded to tell me about an amazing psychology experiment nicknamed “The Good Samaritan Study.”

In the study, researchers positioned themselves across from a pay phone and studied the people who made phone-calls. One of the first things they discovered was that almost everyone who makes a call looks in the coin return after hanging up to see if any coins happen to be there. The urge is irresistible: You just have to look in the coin return to see if the machine has mistakenly returned your money!

This behavior gave the researchers an idea. The next day, they randomly put coins in the coin return slot, so that some of the people who used the phone actually did discover money. The researchers then hired a young woman to walk by the phone at the exact moment that the subjects were hanging it up. When the young woman walked by with her arms full of books, she pretended to stumble and drop them on the ground.

Astonishingly, the researchers observed that the people who found money in the coin return were four times as likely to stop and help the woman pick up her books than were the people who found no money in the coin return. They concluded that when we feel good, we tend to do good, which also means that the helping impulse is transferable. In other words, if you do something good for another person, he or she is much more likely to do something nice for someone else, causing one small gesture to result in a giant ripple effect.

The study does more than confirm what we already knew that when we feel good about ourselves, about our families, about our synagogue—we are more likely to give of our time and energy to help others. It suggests that when I do something nice, kind, or compassionate for another person, that individual is likely to “pay it forward,” not simply because she or he feels a sense of obligation to do so, but because she or he has been made to feel good and wants to bring that sense of joy to others.

There is a Jewish maxim that states: *Mitzvah goreret mitzvah*—“one good deed will bring another good deed” (Pirkei Avot 4:2). While there are several ways to interpret this quote, recognizing that “doing good” inspires others to “do good” lies at the heart of it. While certainly not the only reason that we should treat other people kindly and assist others whenever possible, it is a wonderful reminder that acting thoughtfully, justly, graciously and, dare I say it, righteously, just might begin a chain reaction that will bring our world closer to redemption.

I wish I could say that we're well into the "dog days" of summer, but truth be told, as I write this, we're in the midst of an unusual spell of wet weather. Perhaps as you read this, you would welcome some rain as a respite from the heat of summer!

I love these months as an opportunity to slow the pace of both work and of life in general to recharge and rejuvenate, and then, with a clear mind, to anticipate the year to come.

We all need our down time, in whatever form it may take. Perhaps it is relaxing in your back yard, at a park, or at a beach. Perhaps it's doing the exercise that there never seems to be enough time for during the rest of the year. But Judaism goes a step further; it hallows *Shabbat*, infusing it with a sense of holiness. It's more than a day off; it's a weekly opportunity to reconnect with our faith, our traditions, and our families.

Temple Sinai does not "close for the season" in July and August. We're still here, with our daily *minyanim*, Camp Maccabee, Israeli Scouts concert, *Tisha B'Av* observance, Braiding Bunch, and more.

Oh, I almost forgot there's *Shabbat* as well! During the summer, our services, especially on *Shabbat* mornings, have a different feel. We're in the chapel, which is warm and intimate. (I like to say that thirty voices in the chapel sound like 300!) Many of the services are lay-led, and each week another distinguished member of our congregation offers the *D'var Torah*. It is truly a break from the normal routine.

So this summer, why not make the observance of *Shabbat* at whatever level is comfortable to you a part of your week? Who knows, you may like it so much that it becomes a habit you'll want to embrace year-round!

Did you know?

Sulam means ladder. It appears in the Book of Genesis 28:12 in the description of Jacob's dream during his flight from Esau: "Behold! A ladder (*sulam*) was set on the ground and its top reached heavenward." Our Conservative Movement *chumash* translates *sulam* as "stairway" as in "a stairway was set on the ground." The accompanying commentary suggests that "we ascend toward God one step at a time, making one small change in our lives and stabilizing it before we take another step." This is the process of learning, growth, and maturation that our movement seeks to convey in using the term *sulam* in the titles of its programs for synagogue development: *Sulam* for Presidents, *Sulam* for Emerging Leaders, and *Sulam* for Strategic Planners (in which our congregation is currently enrolled).

Every year our Kitah Hey (fifth grade) students participate in a family history project in which they interview a member of their family to learn more about their family's history. Students interviewed their relatives, gathered pictures and documents, and created a project that they shared with their teachers, classmates, and their parents. The students compiled unique, interesting projects, all showcasing different elements from their family histories.

There is actual research that supports the benefits of knowing one's family history. While the results of this research may be lost on our young students, a 2010 Emory University study showed that students who know more about their family history actually have higher self-esteem and are better able to manage stress!

This year, for the first time, we used an online platform—created by the National Museum of American Jewish History with Enwoven—that enables users to collect and share personal stories and photos, as well as audio and video files. Projects from previous years are housed in the Temple Sinai library.

In November, parents were invited to learn about the project. In May, parents were invited, again, to attend a family education event at which Hey students set up their laptops so they could show their classmates and their classmates' families the outcome of their projects. Students chose a few topics to discuss with interested visitors; for example, ask me about the person I was named for, or ask me what school was like when my grandparents went.

"This is really a special way to document our family histories and preserve those stories for years to come," says Deb Levin, one of the Kitah Hey teachers, who oversaw the project.

"Oat" has two distinct meanings:

- 1) Letter, as in a letter of the alphabet
- 2) Sign, mark, or symbol—used in various places in the Bible (in Genesis, Exodus, etc.). For example, the Friday night liturgy contains a Torah passage in which God instructs the Israelites to observe Shabbat: *oat he l'olam*—Shabbat is a sign for all time—a reminder that God created the world in six days and made Shabbat a holy day of rest (Ex. 31:17).

Men's Club Builds Community Garden

It was an unusually cold Sunday afternoon in April, but members of the Men's Club converged outside by the playground, wielding wooden planks, a saw, shovels, and tillers. Their mission: to build a raised vegetable garden bed.

That afternoon—which fell, fittingly, the week before Israel celebrated its 70th anniversary—Larry Jakubowitz, David Levin, Rob Rosenthal, Chris O'Donnell, Jake and Rosie Sitman, and Cobi Weissbach finished building the 16-by-4-foot bed just as the sun was setting.

TEMPLE SINAI ISRAEL AMBULANCE CAMPAIGN UPDATE



As you are aware, this past fall Temple Sinai partnered with other synagogues in Bucks and Montgomery Counties in a campaign to purchase a new ambulance for the Magen David Adom (MDA) in honor of Israel's 70th Birthday.

I am delighted to announce that to date, we have raised over \$6000 toward the purchase of a new ambulance for MDA. Tremendous thanks to all of you who participated so generously. The campaign is being extended through the summer and you may still participate in this important and much needed cause for Israel.

All contributions of any amount are greatly appreciated. Please make checks payable to Temple Sinai and insert MDA AMBULANCE in the memo section and mail to: Temple Sinai, 1401 N. Limekiln Pike, Dresher, PA 19025

Israel's need is for over 100 new ambulances every year. These ambulances, which are generously donated by American donors are also built in the US. The cost to fund a standard ambulance is \$100,000.00.

Once the ambulance is ordered and built to Israeli specs, it will then come to our area for a dedication ceremony and celebration before it leaves for Israel. The doors of the ambulance will read "Presented to the People of Israel by....." This effort will continue to involve our entire synagogue through education materials and bring our community together for a wonderful and vital cause. A portion of the proceeds from April's Temple Sinai Israel 70 Fest were donated to this campaign.

MDA is Israel's official ambulance service, blood services, and disaster rescue agency. Each of Israel's 8 million residents relies on the paramedics of MDA to respond to all emergencies, including suicide bombers or rocket attacks near the country's borders. Virtually everyone in Israel knows someone whose life has been saved by MDA. The organization operates in every part of Israel, helping every man, woman and child regardless of race, religion, or political affiliation.

When there's an emergency in Israel — when a car crashes or when a bomb falls — everyone dials 101.

Every 45 seconds, day and night, 365 days a year, an MDA ambulance is called. MDA must be ready for any event that touches the lives of Israelis every day.

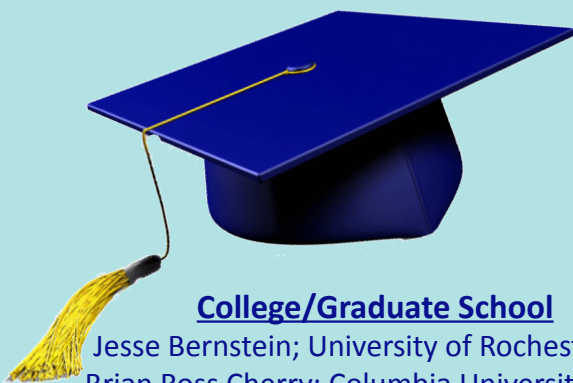

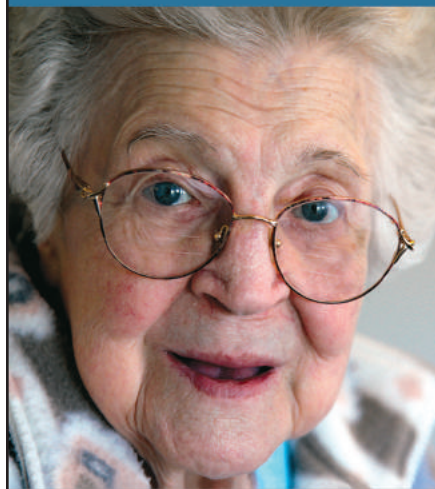
